Credit unions are non-profit financial cooperatives, originally created in Europe more than 150 years ago to help sustain local savings and lending during hard times. Groups of individuals with common bond "banded together" to pool their funds and then loaned them back out to fellow members, expanding their financial horizons. In this way, individual members and the community benefited from the cooperative arrangement.

More relevant than ever, banking at your local credit union can be a great financial decision. While operations are periodically reviewed by independent auditors and government agencies (the latter of which allows deposits to be insured up to \$250,000 by the National Credit Union Administration), the members of each credit union really control their own destiny through a Board of Directors they elect annually from their membership. All Directors (and Board Committees) serve as loyal and selfless volunteer leaders who set policy and strategic direction without any compensation and with the best interests of their fellow members at heart.

Credit union members are also the sole owners of their cooperative. There are no outside stockholders to please, so any profits – in excess of operational costs and required reserves – are generally returned to members as monthly dividends on their share deposits, or as special patronage (ownership) dividends as may be declared by their Board from time to time. The focus isn't on Wall Street but on Main Street.

All things considered, credit unions are quite simply a better way to bank.

In October 1933, a small group of refinery workers in Ponca City organized the Conoco Employees (PC) Credit Union, which at that time was only the second credit union chartered in the Great State of Oklahoma. We retained that name until July 1994, when it was changed to Cherokee Strip Credit Union, the name we continue to enjoy today.

CHEROKEE STRIP CREDIT UNION MINUTES OF THE

91ST ANNUAL MEETING OF MEMBERS

The 91st Annual Meeting of Cherokee Strip Credit Union was held Monday, March 25, 2024 in the conference rooms of Pioneer Technology Center at 2101 North Ash in Ponca City, Oklahoma. All Board Directors were present, including Dr. Robert Howard, Mike Trewitt, Toni Gibson, John Happ, Sherri Tapp, Brandon Rutz, Bill Geubelle, Winston Henry, and Phillip Johnston. All Associate Directors were also present, including Ariana Alva and Dawn Brakey. Cherokee Strip Insurance Agency Marketing Officer & local agent Randy Tyner recorded the proceedings. The Meeting was called to order at 6:00 pm by Chairman Howard, as Secretary Gibson certified a quorum present with 88 Members in attendance. Chairman Howard also confirmed proper Notice of Meeting was given according to our Bylaws. Referring to Page 2 of the Credit Union's 2023 Annual Report booklet, Chairman Howard asked for changes or corrections to minutes from the prior annual meeting. With none noted, Member Howard made a motion to approve the minutes as presented, Member Buellesfeld offered a second, and upon vote the motion passed with none opposed.

Chairman Howard shared his report with the Membership, thanked fellow Directors & Committees for their volunteer service, and recognized the contributions of CEO Spike Henderson and team. He also recognized former CEO's Sissel and O'Hare, who were in attendance. Chairman Howard then yielded the podium to Treasurer Happ for his financial report, who turned the floor over to Director Tapp for her Supervisory Committee report, as CEO Henderson subsequently presented his report.

Secretary Gibson then shared a Scholarship Committee report, recognizing prior year winners as detailed on Pages 15 & 16 of the 2023 Annual Report, and subsequently announcing Members Woods, Fredricks, George, Swanson, Meeks, Otto, Barnett, Rabb, Branstetter, Hamblin, Maloney, and Graham as 2024 award recipients. The winners in attendance gathered for a group picture with the Scholarship Committee, and our Membership congratulated them all. Mr. Tyner then rose to present an update on our Cherokee Strip Insurance Agency subsidiary, and subsequently yielded the podium to Vice President MacKinnon for a Culture Committee report.

After Mr. MacKinnon's comments, Secretary Gibson approached the podium to present a Resolution ratifying all Acts and Proceedings of the Board & Committees over the past year. Chairman Howard then asked for a joint motion to approve the Resolution, and Treasurer & Supervisory Committee reports. Member Zanardi made a motion to approve all as proposed, Member Rolland offered a second, and upon vote the motion passed with none opposed. Chairman Howard then asked for any unfinished business, with none noted. He also asked for any new business, with none noted.

Chairman Howard then deferred to Director Henry for his Nominating Committee report, who offered Board candidates Happ, Tapp, and Trewitt for consideration as detailed on Page 10 of the 2023 Annual Report. Chairman Howard asked for additional nominations from the floor three times. With none noted, he declared nominations closed. Member Zanardi then made a motion to elect the incumbent slate for new 3-year terms, Member Austin offered a second, and upon vote the motion passed with none opposed.

Chairman Howard asked for any other items to come before the Board. With none noted, he closed by declaring a special patronage dividend of nearly \$ 214,000 to be shared among Member/Owners in good standing as of December 31, 2023. This special dividend is a partial return of Credit Union earnings directly into Member share savings accounts, to be paid on or before June 1, 2024. After that declaration, the business of the Membership concluded, and Chairman Howard adjourned the Meeting at 6:53 pm. He then introduced Director of Technology & Logistics Love for the presentation of door prizes. With assistance from our Associates, 10 awards of \$20 cash, 5 awards of \$50 cash, 3 awards of \$100 cash, and 1 award of \$250 cash were presented in total to Members Johnston, Buellesfeld, George, Giddens, Bland, Long, Sumpter, Meeks, Webb, Voelkers, Otto, Howard, Rascon, Koivisto, Scott, Failing, Black, Cohenour, and Horinek.



Treasurer REPORT



John Happ, Board Treasurer

John will be long remembered for his service to CSCU and its members. He was our Treasurer when he passed and given this the report is presented by him in spirit and in his honor. 2024 can best be summarized as an asset transition year as the area where we had been experiencing our strongest asset growth came to a roaring halt. From January 2020 through December 2023 our consumer loan portfolio grew from \$42 million to over \$56 million mostly in the used automobile area. Frankly, the timing of this growth came at the worst possible time as the entire used auto finance industry began having delinquency and charge off problems in the 4thquarter of 2023 and throughout 2024. We will cover the charge-off problems below in the income statement area. As a result, CSCU significantly tightened the requirements for obtaining a used automobile loan and with very little new volume, regular payments, payoffs, and charge-offs the consumer portfolio dropped \$16 million back down to \$40 million at the end of 2024. As you see from the graph below, even though consumer loan balances declined \$16 million, we were able to make up the majority with commercial and residential loan growth. In 2024, commercial loans increased \$10 million and residential loans increase \$2 million. The net was a decrease of \$4 million in loans. This transition was necessary given the current volatility in the used auto finance arena and the need to find profitable alternative earning assets with the share deposits on hand. We will carefully move back into the used auto finance sector as the volatility declines. Otherwise on the Balance Sheet, total assets and shares were stable in 2024 growing \$1 million year over year. With share balances remaining stable and decline in loans, funds deposited into our money market account at the Federal Reserve increased substantially.

We ended the year with a net loss of \$577k. This was a direct result of the charge-offs in the used auto portfolio discussed above. In 2024, CSCU provided \$1.2 million to the loan loss reverses to offset the charged-off used auto loans. Net income before the provisions for loan losses was a net positive \$660k. Without the growth experienced in the commercial and residential loans, this loss would have been substantially higher. Looking into 2025, we do expect the consumer portfolio to continue to decline, but at a much slower pace as we anticipate slowly moving back into auto financing. At the same time, we expect to continue the growth in the commercial and consumer real estate portfolios. Ultimately, with less charge offs and higher loan volumes we expect to return to profitability in 2025 and beyond.

While 2024 was a rough year from a net income standpoint, we continue to remain strong in several areas including capital reserves, liquidity and net interest margin. Liquidity is especially important with our plan to continue to expand in the commercial and real estate lending areas. Turning those deposits at the federal reserve into loan assets will have a major positive impact on our earnings.

Finally, Return to the Member continues as a high priority. We were pleased to see 2024 dollars returned to you continue to grow. The combination of Loan Rewards Club rebates, Rewards draft checking benefits, deposit dividends, and the special patronage dividend declared at our 91st Annual Meeting exceeded the past 4 years. The desire to continue to find creative ways to add value to your membership at CSCU remains as a focus for Spike and the Board.

The Supervisory Committee was established and authorized by the Board of Directors to provide independent oversight of management operations. Our primary objective is to ensure that appropriate controls, policies, and procedures are implemented to safeguard our Cooperative and protect your ownership interest in Cherokee Strip Credit Union.

To achieve this, we conduct independent reviews and may engage external professionals as needed. We oversee the efforts of these experts by approving annual audit programs and reviewing their findings. Should any concerns arise, we promptly report them to the Board during their regular monthly meetings. In addition to our auditors, we also collaborate with government regulators during their periodic safety and soundness examinations.

In 2024, we re-engaged the regional CPA firm CliftonLarsonAllen (CLA), leveraging their extensive experience in auditing cooperatives nationwide. CLA conducted our Automated Clearing House audit, the Bank Secrecy Act audit, the Secure and Fair Enforcement of Mortgage Lending (SAFE) audit, and our annual year-end Agreed Upon Procedures, which provide a comprehensive examination of our operations. I am pleased to report that my Committee identified no material concerns this year.

Beyond our audits, the Oklahoma Banking Department (OBD) and the National Credit Union Administration (NCUA) perform formal regulatory examinations on a rotating schedule. As we are state-chartered while your membership shares are federally insured up to at least \$250,000 by the NCUA, these examinations are critical. The OBD conducted an examination in March 2024, and both regulators have expressed satisfaction with our progress as a well-capitalized credit union. Based on their feedback, we expect our next examination to take place in the summer of 2025.

I would like to extend my gratitude to my Committee members, Ariana Alva and Dawn Brakey, for their dedicated volunteer service. Additionally, I want to personally thank all of you, our fellow Members, for entrusting us with the oversight of your family's valued investment in Cherokee Strip Credit Union.
